



ELECTRONIC CIGARETTE POLICY

Electronic Cigarette

An electronic cigarette can also be called an e-cigarette, e-cigar, vape, vape pen or personal vapour.

An electronic cigarette is considered to be a smoking product under the Tobacco and Other Smoking Products Act 1998 and cannot be sold to children under 18 years of age. In Australia, it is illegal to sell or buy nicotine for use in an electronic cigarette.

This policy applies to electronic cigarettes that do and do not contain nicotine.

Responsibilities

Students

Students must not bring property onto school grounds or other settings used by the school that:

- is prohibited according to the school's Prohibited Items Policy.
- is illegal.
- puts the safety or wellbeing of others at risk.
- does not preserve a caring, safe, supportive or productive learning environment.
- does not maintain and foster mutual respect.

Parent/Carer

Parents/Carers must ensure their child does not bring property onto school grounds or other settings used by the school that:

- is prohibited according to the school's Prohibited Items Policy.
- is illegal.
- puts the safety or wellbeing of others at risk.
- does not preserve a caring, safe, supportive or productive learning environment.
- does not maintain and foster mutual respect.

School

The school must inform parents/carers of school policies and procedures.

Staff must follow school policies and procedures.

Safety Concerns

An electronic cigarette may:

- deliver unreliable doses of nicotine
- leak their contents
- be a poisoning risk, particularly for children
- not list the presence and/or actual strength of nicotine on the product label
- contain other unknown, possibly toxic chemicals
- have incorrect or inconsistent labelling and unsafe packaging
- encourage the uptake of smoking
- have no child safety measures, and
- be unsafe to use during pregnancy.

Many electronic cigarette cartridges also contain other potentially harmful ingredients such as propylene glycol (a solvent to produce fog or smoke used in theatrical productions), polyester compounds, anti-freeze, or vegetable glycerine.

Nicotine is a dangerous poison and can cause serious injury and death. It can be absorbed through the skin.

Liquid nicotine refill for electronic cigarettes are particularly dangerous to younger children who might be attracted by the packaging and the use of fruit and confectionery flavouring, such as chocolate, bubble gum, apple, and watermelon.



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The median lethal dose of nicotine has been estimated to be 6.5–13 mg/kg; hence, an accidental ingestion of one tablespoon of commercially available liquid nicotine refill is sufficient to induce irreversible damage or death, particularly in children.

Consequence Guidelines

Electronic Cigarettes are a prohibited item as outlined in the school's Prohibited Items Policy.

The following consequences are a guide only.

Possession of Electronic Cigarette:

Consequences reset each term.

Step 1	•Electronic Cigarette is permanently confiscated.
Step 2	•Parent/carer notified.
Step 3	•Police notified for collection.
Step 4	•Consequence issued - First occasion: 1 day Internal Withdrawal.
Step 5	•Student referred to Youth Health Nurse for counselling.
Step 4	•Consequence issued - Second and subsequent occasions: 3 day Suspension.
Step 5	•Student referred to Youth Health Nurse for counselling.

Use of Electronic Cigarette:

Consequences reset each term.

Step 1	•Electronic Cigarette is permanently confiscated.
Step 2	•Parent/carer notified.
Step 3	•Police notified for collection.
Step 4	•Consequence issued - First occasion: 3 day Suspension.
Step 5	•Student referred to Youth Health Nurse for counselling.
Step 4	•Consequence issued - Second and subsequent occasions: 5 day Suspension.
Step 5	•Student referred to Youth Health Nurse for counselling.



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Distribution/Supply of Electronic Cigarette:

Consequences do not reset each term.

Step 1	• Electronic Cigarette is permanently confiscated.
Step 2	• Parent/carer notified.
Step 3	• Police notified for collection.
Step 4	• Consequence issued - First occasion: 5 day Suspension.
Step 5	• Student referred to Youth Health Nurse for counselling.
Step 4	• Consequence issued - Second occasion: 10 day Suspension.
Step 5	• Student referred to Youth Health Nurse for Counselling.
Step 6	• Consequence issued - Third occasion: 20 day Suspension.
Step 7	• Student referred to Youth Health Nurse for Counselling.
Step 8	• Consequence issued: 20 day Suspension pending Exclusion.

Consideration of Individual Circumstances

Staff at Gordonvale State High School take into account students' individual circumstances, such as their behaviour history, verified disability, diagnosed mental health and wellbeing, religious and cultural considerations, home environment and care arrangements when teaching expectations, responding to inappropriate behaviour or applying a disciplinary consequence.

In considering the individual circumstances of each student, we recognise that the way we teach, the support we provide and the way we respond to students will differ. This reflects the principle of equality, where every student is given the support they need to be successful. This also means that not everyone will be treated the same, because treating everyone the same is not fair.

Our teachers are also obliged by law to respect and protect the privacy of individual students, so while we understand the interest of other students, staff and parents to know what punishment another student might have received, we will not disclose or discuss this information with anyone but the student's family. This applies even if the behavioural incident involves your child. You can be assured that school staff take all matters seriously and will address them appropriately. We expect that parents and students will respect the privacy of other students and families.

If you have concerns about the behaviour of another student at the school, or the way our staff have responded to their behaviour, please make an appointment with the Principal to discuss the matter.
